Memorial Day to be Observed In .
This Borough With a .
Street Parade

WRIGHTSVILLE, May 27.—Plans for the local observance of Memorial day were made at the recent meeting of the American Legion post. No. 469, with Commander Noah Kisner in charge. The observance will be the regular street parade with approximately 10 or more marching groups. This parade, which will form on South Second street at the fire engine house will move promptly at 2 p. m. (DST). Included in the lineup will be the following groups: Chief marshal, Civil War veteran, George Watson; American Legion Drum and Bugle corps, Wrightsville Chapter of War Mothers, American Legion post, No. 469, Ladies auxiliary; Spanish War veterans, Capt. Martin H. Smith camp, No. 67; Windsor band; Wrightsville Fire company, No. 1, and other marching groups, consisting of children and adults, including Sunday schools.

The parade route will be west on Hellam street from the engine house on Second street, to North Fourth street at the "Constituional Park," for a short Memorial service, after which they will continue to Fairview cemetery.

The program for the services at the cemetery, as arranged by Noah Kisner, will be as follows: Singing, "America," invocation, the Rev. C. W. Guinter, pastor of Grace Evangelical church; "Lincoln's Address at Gettysburg," Mary Benedict, a graduate of this year's class of the Wrightsville high school; address, the Rev. George A. Bowie, pastor of the local Presbyterian church benediction, the Rev. Paul D. Leedy, pastor of the Locust Street Methodist church.
